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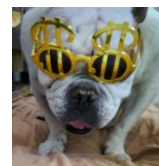
Forbes Rally – January 2026

A new wall was erected two years ago and the location moved near the Henry Parkes museum and the King's Castle Elvis museum. All the

plaques were then relocated to the new wall. It was interesting to read all the names of the names of the plaques – the first one being Johnny O’Keefe. The 2025 recipient was Marcia Hines, who was given her award while we were there. Other plaques on the ground, were also unveiled showing the winning busker of that particular year.
